BBMP to get its own law for better governance

Bill empowers the civic body to levy fee on ads, impose entertainment tax

Both Houses of the Karnataka legislature on Thursday passed the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike Bill, 2020, to give a separate law for the city corporation that ensures a new municipal governance, increases the number of wards from 198 to 243 and empowers it to levy a fee on advertisement and impose entertainment tax.

The Bill was passed amidst

boycott of the session by the principal Opposition Congress and the absence of JD (S) members. Opposition members argued that it was passed without due consultation.

The Bill, that runs into 109 pages, was drafted based on a report of the Legislature's Joint Select Committee headed by BJP MLA S. Raghu. The Bill, among other things, increases the term of the Mayor and the Deputy Mayor from one year to 30

months. With this Bill, the BBMP comes out of the governance structure under the Karnataka Corporation Act (KCA), 1976.

The KCA "is inadequate in administrative and structural matters to govern Bengaluru," said the bill, adding that there is "an urgent need to formulate an independent legislation for the working of the BBMP for the purposes of improving, decentralization, integration of public

participation at various levels of the BBMP."

The Bill allows the government to nominate residents of the city, such as experts in the fields of health, town planning, education, but the number of such members should not exceed 10% of the councillors. The nominated members won't have the right to vote in the meetings of the corporation.

Third phase of vaccine trials begins in Belagavi

The third phase of COVID -19 vaccine trials began in Belagavi on Thursday.

City-based Jeevan Rekha Hospital has made preparations to organise the trials on a large scale and has issued a public appeal asking volunteers to take part.

"We have begun administering the test dose of Covaxin to volunteers," said Paritosh Desai, in charge of the trial process.

As many as 40 volunteers were given the vaccine on Thursday. "We hope to give the vaccine to at least 1,000 volunteers," Dr. Desai said.

He says increased awareness about the vaccine has made their job easier. "Now people know about the vaccine and they are coming forward for the trials," Dr. Desai said. He said the third phase is different from the second in multiple ways. "The test

dose used is almost the same as the final product and the number of volunteers is bigger. Only healthy individuals in a specific age range were selected for the second phase. But in the third phase, any one above the age of 18 will be administered the vaccine. Those with health problems and comorbidities are not rejected," he said.

The vital part is that the third phase involves a place-bo-based double blind and randomised testing. "The process involves the patient receiving two shots of the vaccine or of the placebo two times. After that the volunteers are monitored by the hospital for a year. There is a provision for SOS visits to the hospital if the patients suffer from symptoms or any other problem," he said.

Volunteers of the first and second phase had to make multiple visits to the hospital for monitoring.

Jeevan Rekha has been conducting two separate sets of trials. It conducted the first and the second phase of trials for Covaxin, while it organised only the second phase of trials for ZyCoV-D develped by Zydus Cadilla. As many as 50 healthy young people volunteered for Covaxin and 275 were given the ZyCoV-D doses.

The Belagavi hospital is yet to get the go ahead for the third phase of ZyCoV-D. Reports from the first and second phase trials have proved the safety and efficacy of Covaxin.

"Covaxin, the made-in-India vaccine has been proven to be safe. It has been given to over 25,800 people in 250 centres across the country till now," says Amit Bhate, director of the hospital.

BBMP Bill: More brickbats than bouquets

One of the major drawbacks is the lack of public consultations, say urban planners

The speed with which the State Legislative Assembly passed the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike Bill, 2020, on Thursday has caused a stir among civil organisations and activists. The Bill received more brickbats than bouquets, with many viewing it as another opportunity lost for the much-needed administrative and governance reforms for the city.

The lack of public consultations, apart from no solution to the lack of coordination between different civic agencies and parastatals in the city is one of the major drawbacks in the Bill, said urban planners.

Former Opposition leader in BBMP Council M. Shivaraju, who filed a PIL petition questioning the delay in holding polls to the civic body, termed the Bill as "unconstitutional", going to the extent of calling it a "Black Day" for the city.

In a statement, the non-profit organisation, Janaagraha, said that the Bill should have been far more ambitious and comprehensive, and based on a far more systematic, consultative and well-informed process.

Srikanth Viswanathan, CEO, Janaagrahaa, said: "The silver lining to the cloud is decentralisation of powers and functions to the zones and wards and citizen participation through ward committees and area sabhas. We need to, however, emphasise to the State government that major missing pieces such as metropolitan governance, spatial planning, and financial and human resource capacities, besides digitalisation need to be addressed."

Jagadish Reddy from Varthur Rising maintained that the Bill did not address the problems of the city, especially administrative gaps. The State's exchequer gets nearly 60% revenue from the city and yet, the "myopic Bill" has no vision for Bengaluru's future development, he maintained.

Stating that the BBMP Bill was better than the Karnataka Municipal Corporations Act, 1976, in some ways, urban expert V. Ravichandar, who was also part of the government-constituted BBMP Restructuring Committee, said the hits were the recognition of municipal authorities, such as Mayor, zonal committees, ward committees and area sabhas, and emphasis on heritage and solid waste management.

But he questioned why the MLAs were made central to the BBMP Bill, when the executive is actually the elected councillor. "There are a few city corporations in the country where the MLAs don't belong to them. The Bill should have ideally taken this path," he said and also pointed out that the drawing of the ward should be citizen centric and not whether it cuts across two or three Assembly constituencies.



State sees 1,238 new cases, 5,076 recoveries

As many as 1,238 new CO-VID-19 positive cases were reported in the State on Thursday. The total number of people who contracted the virus in the State since the start of the pandemic now stands at 8.97 lakh.

In total, 5,076 persons were discharged on Thursday, taking the total number to 8.66 lakh. Twelve people were reported to have succumbed to the virus on

Thursday, taking the total number of deaths to 11,912.

Of the 19,206 active cases, as many as 258 patients are in intensive care units across different designated hospitals.

The number of COVID-19 tests conducted on Wednesday stood at 84,270. However, the positivity rate for the day stood at 1.46% and case fatality rate stood at 0.96%.



Health Dept.'s COVID-19 expenses touch ₹205 cr.

The State Health and Family Welfare Department has so far incurred expenses of ₹205 crore towards handling the COVID-19 pandemic, Home Minister Basavaraj Bommai informed the Karnataka Legislative Council on Thursday.

Apart from this, ₹108.75 crore has been spent on salaries, incentives, and risk allowances paid to employees. During the lockdown period, the State had distributed ad-

ditional 5 kg of rice to eligible families under PDS and had spent ₹711.62 crore towards this, the Minister said.

Replying to members during a discussion on supplementary estimates aggregating to ₹3,320.4 crore, the Minister said the Health Department had spent ₹205 crore on procuring equipment, testing kits, and other required infrastructure.

After a nearly three-hour discussion, the estimates were approved by the Council.

BBMP to get its own law

Law and Parliamentary Affairs Minister J.C. Madhuswamy, who tabled the Bill, said only MLAs whose constituencies are within the BBMP limits and MLCs who are registered voters in the corporation would become members of the corporation. The Bill also tweaks functions of standing committees, he said.

The Bill empowers the BBMP to levy a fee on advertisement and entertainment tax. It said no hoardings would be allowed to be displayed in the city without the written permission of the commissioner. The fee to be collected is not for more than one year period. "After introduction of GST, we could not levy tax on advertisements. Instead of a tax, there will be a fee," he said.

Entertainment tax should be levied and collected by the BBMP over any ticket-based, non-ticket-based, and televisied entertainment, in accordance with the Act.

Rainwater harvesting has been made mandatory for houses built on 60 x 40 sq.ft. and more area.

Government wants to put off BBMP polls: Oppn.

Councillors and leaders in the Congress are up in arms over the State Assembly passing the BBMP Bill, 2020, a day after the Joint Legislature Committee constituted to review it submitted its report.

Abdul Wajid, former Opposition leader in BBMP Council, who had also filed a PIL petition in the High Court of Karnataka, questioning the delay in holding polls to the civic body along

with M. Shivaraju, also former Opposition leader, said the main agenda of the government seemed to be to put off polls to the BBMP for a couple of years.

"They want to achieve this by hook or crook. The government is likely to appeal against the High Court order in the Supreme Court by presenting this as a ruse," he said.

HC direction

The High Court had recently directed the State government

and the State Election Commission to hold polls for the 198 wards in BBMP.

The court held that allowing application of amendment to the Karnataka Municipal Corporations Act, 1976, which increased the number of wards to the BBMP, would be contrary to the constitutional mandate of timely holding of elections.

Concurring with Mr. Wajid, Mr. Shivaraju said the court had noted that the process of delimitation, reservation and amendment with regard to number of wards should have happened at least six months before the end of the term of council. The term of the council ended on September 10, 2020.

Role of Assembly

Urban experts Ashwin Mahesh said the Assembly clearing the Bill appeared to be a legislative response to the court's ruling to the SEC to declare the elections to the BBMP within six weeks from the date of publication of

final reservation notification by the government.

'Local governments'

"There needs to be a mechanism to ensure that the government doesn't decide when to hold polls to the local bodies by setting up a delimitation commission that is separate from the SEC.

"It is only when local bodies are considered to be local governments that there will be unbroken elections," he said.





New BBMP Act gets mixed response from citizen groups, policymakers

Dub it 'missed opportunity' to transform city

The new Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike Act 2020 has evoked a mixed response among citizens, policymakers, civic activists and residents' welfare associations.

Contrary to the government's view that the act is an independent legislation that would decentralise and bringin public participation at various levels of the municipal governance, citizen groups dubbed it a "missed opportunity" to transform the city, barring a few good aspects.

To get the measure of the public opinion about the newly promulgated legislation,
DH spoke to a cross section of
the society, including former
members of the BBMP restructuring committee, activists, retired bureaucrats, RWAs and
political parties.

While people have welcomed the decentralisation measures that would give more powers to zones and wards, many termed it negative without bringing in parastatal agencies like BMTC, Bescom, BWSSB and BDA, among others.

V Ravichandar, part of the three-member expert committee on BBMP restructuring, said the bill is different from their recommendations for the city administration

"Our committee had worked on a bill that included all parastatal agencies. The one that is passed is purely a BBMP Act. The difference, effectively, is day and night," he said.

He added that the zonal provisions and articulation of the municipal authorities are better than the existing ones despite grey areas on the roles of the mayor and commissioner. He said the city needs an overall Bengaluru-specific bill catering to the 21st century problems. But the bill now focuses on the BBMP, which like solving the 20th century problems that are now passe.

Tara Krishnaswamy, co-founder, Citizens for Bengaluru, said if other agencies had been brought into the act and allowed to function under

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Terming the act a regressive step, Srikanth Narasimhan of the newly founded Bengaluru Nava Nirmana Party said: "We needed a civic body free from the interference of MLAs. But the very first line of the bill contradicts its own intentions. Progress can only be achieved when the city is unshackled from the clutches of the MLAs and state government, besides making BBMP a fully empowered autonomous organisation."

"It is surprising that no public consultation was made pertaining to the act of this magnitude, if at all the government's intention was to truly govern the city in a progressive manner," she said.

"If the civic body is unable to

maintain the existing limits by providing better civic amenities, then what is the use of expanding it even further? Except the real estate and vested interest linked with the politics over these areas, the approach is senseless and illogic as all the evidence suggest the failure of the corporation at every ward," Tara added.

Citizens group Whitefield Rising called the bill unscientific and lacked the foresight to make Bengaluru the Silicon Valley it deserves to be for the kind of tax citizens pay.

Anjali Saini of Whitefield Rising said: "The villages in the periphery that are proposed to be included into the BBMP limits are better off with the gram panchayats.

They are governed better

than the way BBMP is governing the existing wards.

The land value increases by urbanising the peripheral areas where people with vested interests probably own land. The bill has nothing to do with civicservices and governance."

Srikanth Vishwanathan, CEO, Janaagraha said: "The silver lining could be the decentralisation of powers and functions to the zones and wards and citizen participation through ward committees. The Legislative Assembly on Thursday passed the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) Bill, which promises a new governance structure for the city besides increasing its municipal area.

At present, Bengaluru is governed under the Karna-

The BBMP Bill proposes to make rainwater harvesting mandatory for properties located on sites measuring 60x40 and above, Law Minister J C Madhuswamy said. "Such properties will be required to store rainwater and help solve the city's water problems. Earlier, the proposal was to make it mandatory for everybody. But, we have confined this to 60x40 sites and above," he said.

taka Municipal Corporations Act. That the city should get a separate law was a long-pending demand.

The Bill, drafted by a joint select committee, was passed with the Opposition benches empty as the Congress had decided to boycott the proceedings whereas the JD(S) did not

show up.

The Bill proposes "constituency consultative committees", which are expected to give MLAs more say in the way the city is run.

Piloting the Bill, Law Minister J C Madhuswamy said Bengaluru needed a separate law as the city had become unwieldy

"Much has changed since the last delimitation was done. We are not able to define what is BBMP and what is a gram panchayat or a town panchayat," he said.

"On par with the rising population and area, we want to provide good administration for the city," he added.

Once the Bill becomes a law, Bengaluru will have two mayors in five years -- each one getting a 30-month tenure. At present, a mayor has a one-year term.

The Bill proposes to divide the city into zones -- up to 15 -- and each one will have a committee.

"Earlier, there were zonal commissioners. Now, each zone will have a committee that will be responsible for execution of works. They will be empowered to solve problems under their jurisdiction," Madhuswamy said, adding that the existing standing committees will continue.

"The Constituency Consultative Committee will be headed by the local MLA and have members including those from residents' welfare associations.

"This committee will aid the zonal committees, review their functioning, monitor implementation of works and look at how wards that are backward can be developed," Madhuswamy explained.

The bill will result in delimitation and the number of wards in the city will go up from 198 to 243. The city's municipal area will also expand to cover a 1-km radius of the existing boundary, which is expected to consume outlying villages and suburbs.

"There was some confusion on this. What if there are villages just 100-400 metres away from the 1-km radius? Such places can be brought under the municipal limits by way of a separate notification," Madhuswamy said.

The bill has received flak for lack of public consultation during its drafting. Also, it is largely seen as the BJP government's ploy to delay elections to the BBMP.

What does the bill say?

- 30-month tenure for mayor, deputy mayor
- 225-250 wards, but the government has finalised on 243
- Increase BBMP area to cover 1-km radius from existing boundary
- Divide city into zones, up to 15 of them
- Zonal committee headed by a councillor for decentralised decision-making
- Constituency Consultative Committee headed by local MLA

- Coucillors elected as MLA, MLC or MP should retain either one of the posts
- Power to collect fee on advertisements
- Power to levy entertainment tax
- Power to stop dangerous quarrying in BBMP limits
- Creation of Urban Transport Fund
- Grievance Redressal Authority to handle complaints
- BBMP to anchor disaster management efforts






1,238 fresh Covid cases, 12 deaths in state

BENGALURU, DHNS: Karnataka reported 1,238 new Covid-19 infections and 12 related fatalities on Thursday as the case tally swelled to 8,97,801 and the toll to 11,912.

The day also saw 5,076 patients getting discharged after recovery. As on December 10, the number of recoveries went up to 8,66,664. Out of 19,206 active cases, 258 are in ICUs.

Bengaluru Urban accounted for 701 new cases and eight deaths. Among the districts, Mysuru recorded 53 fresh infections, Mandya 46, Hassan 42 and Tumakuru 36.

A total of 1,20,63,741 samples have been tested for Covid-19 in the state of which 84,270 tests were carried out on Thursday.



Of 230m syringes' order, firms have already produced 90m

Bengaluru: Hindustan Syringes & Medical Devices (HMD) and Iscon Surgicals, the two firms that bagged orders for more than 230 million syringes to aid the country's Covid-19 vaccination drive, have already manufactured 90 million pieces. The entire order was to be fulfilled by March 2021.

Iscon from Jhodpur and HMD based in Faridabad, are the only firms contracted by the govern-

ment to supply syringes. The Union ministry of health and family welfare (MoH&FW) on Thursday issued dispatch instructions for 70 million syringes which will soon reach various government warehouses.

"Of the 177.6 million syringes we had to deliver by March, we have already manufactured 70 million," said Rajiv Nath, managing director, HMD. "Today, we got the nod to ship these out. It amounts to 115 truckloads of devices. We've also been told to prepare for additional orders, which will be issued soon."


Sandeep Bhandari, vicepresident, Iscon, which has already manufactured 20 million of the 52.2 million syringes it was contracted to produce, said the firm is yet to get dispatch orders. "Until the government lifts stock, we won't be able to make more devices given storage constraints," he said, adding that the firm is expecting an additional order for about 100 million syringes.

Pointing out that raw material cost has gone up by around 40% in the past four months, Bhandari urged the government to dispose invoices early. "We understand the unprecedented times Covid has created, but we want to contribute to the country," he said.

Both Nath and Bhandari said they were supplying devices at less than Rs 2 per piece. "It's around Re 1.6," Bhandari said, which puts the total cost of 233 million syringes at roughly Rs 37.2 crore.

Besides the order with the government of India, HMD, one of the world's largest syringe suppliers, has orders for 140 million pieces from the Covax facility working for global equitable access. The firm has already shipped more than 100 million pieces of 0.5 ml auto disable (AD) syringes for intramuscular injections to Covax facility. a WHO-led initiative to ensure poor countries have access to the vaccine.

"We are planning to expand capacity to 800 million per annum by the first quarter of 2021 and touch 1,000 million by end of the second quarter," Nath said, while Bhandari said Iscon is looking to expand its capacity from 240 million per annum to about 450 million.



'Why expand BBMP which has failed 110 villages added to it 13 years ago?'

It Must Ensure Amenities First: Activists

Bengaluru: The decision to expand BBMP's jurisdiction has not gone down well with citizen activists. They pointed out that the civic agency is still struggling to manage the 110 villages that came under it 13 years ago.

Tara Krishnaswamy, cofounder of Citizens for Bengaluru (CfB), said the move reeks of realty motives. "The limits of Bengaluru city have been expanded prior to this as well, and it is proven that the BBMP cannot handle it. Where is the need for another expansion? If you move six kilometres away from the city centre, you can see that the roads and infrastructure are in a bad shape. Has BBMP ever thought of fixing this problem?" she asked.

According to her, it is good that the number of wards is increasing from 198 to 243, but BBMP's size does not need to goup. "The Palike has proved it goup. is size accurately needs to shrink," she added.

Srinivas Alavilli from Janaagraha Centre for Citizenship and Democracy said the more you centralise, the less will urban services be available for citizenry. "About 13 years ago when Bengaluru

'TRY ALTERNATIVE MODELS OF GOVERNANCE'

On the city's periphery, there are villages that have urban characteristics and a case could be made for their inclusion," V Ravichandar, civic expert, said. "However, our past record in improving the 110 villages added to BBMP does not inspire confidence," he added.

Bengaluru needs to address the growth issue through alternative models of governance instead of opting for a gigantic single corporation. "For instance, Mumbai absorbed more areas through a multi-corporation setup like Brihanmumbai a multi-corporation, Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation and Thane Municipal Corporation, among others, instead of having one mega corporation," he said.



Mahanagara Palike (BMP) became Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP), 110 villages were adopted, but there has been no development in these added areas," Alavilli said.

Vishnu Prasad, member of Save Bellandur Forum, also felt there's no need for expansion and pointed out the civic body is still developing outlying areas and localities. "They are unable to provide basic facilities to the wards and keep complaining of lack of funds. How will they work now? The objective of the expansion appears to be revenue mobilisation, but how will people survive when there are no basic facilities?" he asked. In-

stead of expanding the city limits, they need to work towards improving roads and provide streetlights, he added. "Many areas in Bellandur do not have basic UGD lines, water lines and roads. BBMP's boundary to be expanded; number of wards increased from 198 to 243

n Thursday, the Legislative Assembly approved the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike's (BBMP) Bill 2020, promising sweeping administrative and structural changes. Now, gram panchayats and town municipalities within one square km radius of BBMP will be added to the civic body. With that, the number of wards will increase from 198 to 243.

Prior to tabling this Bill, the BBMP was governed by the Karnataka Municipal Corporation Act 1976. The Bill was tabled by the Law Minister JC Madhuswamy on behalf of Chief Minister, in the absence of the Congress. On Wednesday, a Joint House Committee of the legislature tabled a report on the BBMP's Bill.

Longer Mayoral tenure

The Mayor, Deputy Mayor and members of various Standing Committees will get 30 months tenure instead of Just a year. A similar system exists in Zilla Panchayats, where the president and vice president are given a 30-month

Besides this, the number of divisions in the BBMP will be increased from eight to 15. Each of these zones will act as an independent civic body with one of the corporators named as president, besides a committee of legislators to guide in each of the Assembly segments. Zonal joint commissioners are allowed to function independently and take decisions.

The number of standing committees will also be reduced, while

adding more members to each of such committees, to provide representation to all corporators.

Guidance Value Linked Property Tax

Instead of collecting the property tax on net asset value (NAV), the BBMP Bill proposes a more dynamic tax formula linked to the guidance value of the property fixed by the Stamps and Registration department.

With the revision of guidance

value every year, the property taxes are likely to go up or come down due to the revision. Similarly, the Bill proposes Solid Waste Management Corporation that will be given complete responsibility for collection, segregation, transportation and conversion of waste into energy. The corporation is also given powers to collect entertainment and advertisement taxes. After shifting to GST, the BBMP was not allowed to collect these taxes.

No Dual Membership

Unlike under the Karnataka Municipal Corporation (KMC) Act that allowed corporators to continue even after getting elected to legislature or parliament, the new Bill makes it clear that a member who is elected to the legislature

or parliament must quit one of the seats within six months after being elected.

Delay Tactic

With neither the government nor Opposition city lawmakers keen to hold BBMP polls, the tabling and approval of the Bill in a hurry is seen as an effort to scuttle an early election. Recently, the High Court directed the State Election Commission to conduct the election to 198 wards as per the existing law. The government is likely to approach the court to hold elections as per the new law which would mean that the elections will be deferred indefinitely as a reorganisation of wards, revision of voter list and reservation of wards will take at least a year to complete.

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ity appears to be taking baby steps with regard to segregating waste at source. In 38 wards where two vehicles are being sent to collect wet and dry waste separately, as part of the new system, the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) is seeing anywhere between 1 per cent and 39 per cent segregation in 27 wards. The remaining nine wards still collect mixed waste from both bulk generators and the houses.

These figures are part of the performance report prepared by the BBMP over a period of four months since July. The top five wards - which are showing improvements with regard to wet and dry waste segregation are: Singasandra, Rayapuram, Nayandahalli, Mangana Palya and Uttarahalli. The ones in the bottom are: Siddapura, Nagarabhavi, Mudalapalya, Vasanthpura, Chowdeswari

With zero segregation, some of the wards have shown no improvement at all. They are Bharathi Nagar, Shivajinagar and KR Puram.

The biker was only able to do this as there were no street lights and I was the only woman walking at that time," she said.

Hulimavu police said that they have taken the complaint. "She asked us to get the street lights fixed first so that women feel safe. We have informed BBMP to fix the lights. She is yet to file a written complaint," said the officer. BBMP workers later fixed the streetlights.

Annaswamy Mudaliar Road still awaits concrete plans

Slush-filled road has become a nightmare for motorists and residents

he inordinate delay in restoration of Annaswamy Mudaliar Road has been making the lives of around 100 families miserable. Motorists proceeding towards Cox Town and other areas through this stretch too are facing a tough time.

As the road becomes slushy whenever it rains thus, they have to navigate deep puddles of accumulated water on this road. There have been instances of vehicles getting stuck in the slush on this road. Residents have said that though complaints have been lodged with the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) authorities, including Palike administrator Gaurav Gupta, nothing has been done till date.

They said that though Gupta presided over the ward committee meetings and directed BBMP engineers to complete work but it is either stopped or progressing at a snail's pace.

Despite repeated complaints to BBMP, including Palike administrator Gaurav Gupta, no action has been taken

"We are fed up of complaining to the authorities concerned about the condition of this road. There is no coordination among the different departments of the BBMP and the Bangalore Water Supply and Sewerage Board (BWSSB). They are busy shifting the blame on others," said V Purushotham of Ulsoor Rising.

Shanmugam P, a resident of Sivanchetty Garden, emphasised on the need to expedite the completion of the work to avoid slush and dust on this road.





"It is quite shocking to see work progressing at a snail's pace on this small stretch. The work began five months ago and is still incomplete," said Shanmugam.

Assembly Clears BBMP Bill Proposing Changes in City Administration

Bengaluru: Karnataka's legislative assembly on Thursday passed the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) Bill, proposing to bring some changes to the city's governance, though most sections have been taken from the Karnataka Municipal Corporation Act, 1976, that currently governs Bengaluru.

The BJP government ensured the passage of the Bill even as the opposition Congress boycotted the session protesting the passage of the anti-cow slaughter law, while JD(S) members did not turn up.

The Bill, which runs for about 110 pages, seeks to increase the number of BBMP wards from the existing 198 to minimum 225 and maximum 250. Unlike now, where several wards are split between different assembly segments, the BBMP bill has mandated that wards are divided within the assembly segments and no ward should spread over two constituencies and that they should have equal distribution of population.

A joint select committee headed by BJP MLA from CV Raman Nagar S Raghu proposed changes to the BBMP's structure and that has been incorporated in the Bill.

The separate law for the BBMP has also introduced a 30-month term for the mayor and the deputy mayor, while the term of standing committees continues to be one year. The change will cut the number of mayors to two over a period of five years. The existing provisions in the KMC Act permit the election of a mayor and deputy mayor every 12 months.

The Bill has paved way for increasing the number of zones from eight to 15. Each zone will be headed by zonal commissioners who will re-

port to the BBMP's chief commissioner.

A new feature requires formation of constituency consultative committees and zonal committees, similar toward committees, but at the assembly and zonal level. The constituency committee headed by the local MLA, consisting of councillors and resident association members, gives more power to legislators in matters related to the ward.

The Bill has identified responsibilities of the committees that will include aid

and advice to zonal committees, monitor the project implementation and respond to public grievances.

The zonal committees chaired by one of the ward councillors will also look at project implementation and coordination between wards. Another change the bill has proposed is to increase the property tax every year on the basis of the guidance value, which is revised by the stamps and registration department.

PRS Legislative Research, an independent research institute that has analysed the BBMP Bill, has highlighted several shortcomings that may prevent Bengaluru's governance from undergoing structural changes. The institute has pointed out that the state government continues to hold power over the city administration, which will be a major obstacle in achieving decentralisation of power.



As Recoveries Rise, City Sees Steep Fall in Active Cases

As on November 1, the active cases in Bengaluru was 30,598. It dropped to 17,769 by mid-November. But with the number of new cases and recoveries reported on a daily basis remaining almost equal, the city's active cases continued to be close to 17,000 by the end of November. The last eight days saw a slight increase in active cases as the recoveries fell. Active cases stood at 19,468 on December 8, raising caution.

Health and medical education minister K Sudhakar had told ET on Wednesday that the rise in active cases in the first week of December was because of delay in updating discharges in the online portal. "I have asked officials to fix the gaps," he said.

A BBMP official said while discharges in hospitals were recorded and updated on a daily basis, the same was not happening in home isolation cases. "We need to track Covid positive persons in home isolation and consider it as recovery on the 10th day," he said.

STATE LOGS 1,238 CASES

Karnataka reported 1,238 Covid cases on Thursday even as the recoveries rose to 5,076. The state's total cases has reached 897,801 of which 376,592 are from Bengaluru. The state also recorded 12 deaths including eight in the capital.

ment said. Subsequently, the rate of testing of samples sent by the government to private laboratories has been reduced to \$500 from \$800 per test. "As the rates of chemicals and equipment used to test Covid-19 has come down, the technical advisory committee has recommended to revise the cost of testing," the health department said. The state has fixed 1,250 for Truenat test and ₹2,400 for CB Nat test. The cos of testing Rapid Antigen in private labs is capped at ₹400.

1,279 NEW CASES IN STATE

Karnataka reported 1,279 new cases of Covid, of which 728 were from Bengaluru, taking the case tally to 896,563. Nineteen Covid deaths were recorded including, 13 in Bengaluru.
