PM tells States to prepare for vaccine distribution

We must keep our focus on making sure there is no unmanageable surge in cases. We don't know which vaccine will pass the scientific parameters for disbursal in our country and by what date, but I want all States to set up steering committees and task forces down to the block-level for preparing for vaccine disbursal," he said.

Mr. Modi added: "It will be a large-scale enterprise looking at the size of our country and keeping in mind our experience with large immunisation campaigns, we want this to be a smooth exercise with great coordination with State governments, who are the best judge of how things are to be done in particular States."

The government was in touch "in real time" with vaccine candidate institutions, manufacturers, international organisations and governments coordinating vaccine efforts and international companies to ensure that information on vaccine availability was up to date, he said.

Cold storage facilities

While the availability of vaccines was in the hands of scientists and the pricing depended on various factors, as public servants, governments should prepare cold chain spots, and availability of staff for disbursal and also any "adverse events" regarding side effects of the vaccine.

"Regardless of everything, whichever vaccine is distributed in our country, rest assured it will have passed all the scientific parameters," he said.

Over 71% of those who succumbed to COVID-19 in State are men

The high mortality in men points to better immune response among women

COVID-19 deaths in the State reported among men outnumber those in women by a ratio of 2.5:1. Although the recovery rate among both genders is almost the same, over 71% (8,382 of the 11,678 deaths reported till November 23) are men, according to the State's COVID War

Of the total 5,38,674 men who tested positive in the State, 5,18,554 have recovered, registering a recovery rate of 96.2%. Of the 3,35,881 women who tested positive, 3,19,596 have recovered, a recovery rate of 95.2%.

The high mortality in men points to better immune response among women, but some doctors say that it is only proportionate to the case positivity among men.

For both the genders, more than half of the deaths occurred in the age group of 50-60 years and 60-70 years.

Better immune response

Doctors said the apparent gender differences in favour of women in the risk of contracting and dying from CO-VID-19 could be due to a better immune response in them. Such trends have also been observed in previous epidemics, including severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS) and Middle East respiratory syndrome (MERS), they said.

Hema Divakar, consultant gynaecologist/obstetrician, said genes are likely to play an important role. "Women tend to have a more responsive immune system compared to men. Several re-

search studies have shown that estrogen, the dominant female hormone, could influence the response to infection as it exhibits antiviral properties," she said.

Stating that the outcome and survival rates from infections or sepsis are often better in women than in men, Dr. Divakar said an article written by Issac Mayonda from the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at St. George's University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, London, U.K., had explored whether estrogen protected women from COVID-19.

"The X chromosomes, of which women possess two, contain the largest number of immune-related genes of the whole human genome, theoretically giving women double the advantage over men in mounting an efficient and rapid immune response," she said quoting the article.

Comorbidities

C.N. Manjunath, director of Sri Jayadeva Institute of Cardiovascular Sciences and Research, who is also part of the State's COVID-19 expert committee, said women generally make healthier lifestyle choices as compared to men. "Women do not smoke or drink as much as men, and they have a lower burden of lifestyle diseases (cardiovascular, diabetes, hypertension or chronic lung conditions). This factor could be the reason for the high mortality among men," he explained.

However, Anoop Amarnath, member of Karnataka's COVID critical care support unit, who heads the department of Geriatric Medicine at Manipal Hospitals, said the mortality is proportionate to the case positivity among men.

Stating that comorbidities may not explain the gender difference, he said: "One potential reason could be the fact that exposure to the virus is high in men compared to women. We need to do a complete analysis regarding this," he added.

Consider promoting students from classes 1 to 9 without exams: Panel

The State's COVID-19 Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) that met on Tuesday to discuss the State's preparedness to deal with a second wave has recommended that the Education Department should consider promoting students from class 1 to 9 without exams.

Sources in the TAC told The Hindu that it would be advisable if exams are held only for class 10 and 12 students. Also, the exams should be postponed and held in May-June instead of the usual March-April and summer holidays should be done away with, the TAC members felt. "With the second wave expected any time after February, the Education Department can take a call on this after due deliberations," said one of the members from TAC.

New cases

Meanwhile, the State on Monday reported 1,870 new cases, taking the total number of cases to 8,76,425. With 17 deaths, the toll rose to 11,695. This is apart from 19 deaths of patients due to non-COVID-19 reasons.

As many as 1,949 people were discharged on Tuesday, taking the total number of recoveries to 8,40,099. Of the remaining 24,612 active patients, 418 were being monitored in the ICU. Bengaluru Urban reported 927 cases, taking its tally to 3,65,317. With 12 deaths coming from Bengaluru, the toll in this district rose to 4,090.

'We're set for vaccine delivery'

29,451 vaccination sites have been identified: Sudhakar

Following directions from the Centre, Karnataka has initiated measures for CO-VID-19 vaccine delivery, distribution and administration, with the State's task force also deliberating on the issue, Health and Medical Education Minister K. Sudhakar said on Tuesday.

The Minister said the government has identified 29,451 session sites (vaccination sites) and 10,008 vaccinators as per the norms of the Universal Immunisation Programme.

Health Care Workers data has already been compiled for all the government facilities. A total of 80% of the private health facilities have also shared their data. Compilation of data for the remaining 20% private facilities is likely to be completed in a week's time, the Minister said in a statement.

Cold storage facilities

The State has around 2,855 cold chain points for storage and distribution of vaccines. With a view to have a better supply chain network and

distribution of vaccines in a timely manner, three new regional vaccine stores - Bengaluru Urban, Shivamogga and Ballari have been proposed. These newly proposed regional vaccine stores will also require additional Walk-in-Coolers and Walk-in-Freezers to be supplied, the Minister said.

"The Union Health Ministry is going to supply three Walk-in-Coolers and two Walk-in-Freezers for which necessary civil work is being initiated. In order to have an exact assessment of the cold storage capacity required for COVID-19 vaccine programme, we first need to assess the number of doses in

CM-led panel to monitor vaccination

Chief Minister B.S. Yediyurappa, along with Chief Ministers of seven other States, participated in a videoconference with Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Tuesday.

After the meeting, Home Minister Basavaraj Bommai told media persons that the government had decided to constitute a State-level steering committee headed by the Chief Minister to monitor vaccination for COVID-19. Similarly, Deputy Commissioners and tahsildars will head steering committees at the district and taluk levels, he said.

"Prime Minister has directed that arrangements for vaccination centres would be similar to the preparations made at the booth-level for elections. Vaccination centres would be formed and workers will be trained for the exercise," the Home Minister said.

On dry storage facility, Mr. Sudhakar said that State has begun the process to assess the requirements. Regarding usage of Animal Husbandry Department's facilities, the Minister said that in order to have adequate capacity the cold storage facilities under the department are also being compiled.

BBMP makes preparations

The Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) has till date registered 95,011 health workers in the city. Most of the government healthcare facilities and medical and paramedical colleges have registered those working or studying there. However, only 1,450 of 4,275 private healthcare facilities in the city have enrolled their employees.

According to BBMP Commissioner N. Manjunath Prasad, the existing infrastructure – storage capacity of 23 lakh vaccine vials, 500 enrolled vaccinators and over 4,000 centres that have earlier administered polio and measles vaccines – is more than enough for the immunisation drive for health workers in the first phase.

Court issues notice to Kannada Chalavali Vatal Paksha over December 5 Karnataka bandh call

Taking note of a call given for a Karnataka bandh on December 5 to oppose the creation of the Maratha Development Board, the High Court of Karnataka on Tuesday ordered notice to the Kannada Chalavali Vatal Paksha, which has given the bandh call.

The court also ordered issue of notice to the BJP, the Congress, the Janata Dal, and the CPI (Marxist) asking them whether they are willing to ensure that their members and workers don't violate COVID-19 norms of wearing masks and maintaining social distance during political rallies/campaigns.

A Division Bench comprising Chief Justice Abhay

Shreeniwas Oka and Justice S. Vishwajith Shetty passed the order during the hearing of a PIL petition filed by Letzkit Foundation, Bengaluru, on COVID-19 norm violations by celebrities, political leaders, and elected representatives.

When brought to the court's notice the call given for bandh, the Bench said there is every likelihood that COVID-19 norms would be set at knot.

Take responsibility

The Bench observed that the "time has come for political parties to take responsibilities to ensure strict adherence to norms of wearing masks and maintaining social distancing during rallies" while pointing out that a large number of instances of violation of norms were by political parties during the recent bypolls to the State Assembly and other political rallies.

Pointing out that the State government for the "sake of taking action" had taken belated steps against some of the party leaders and workers for violation of norms, the Bench said it is the responsibility of all political parties to join hands with the State government to ensure that the norms are strictly implemented during political rallies.

Violations galore

The Bench decided to make political parties as respondents in the proceedings after noticing a large number of violation of norms and actions initiated by the State government only after the court took cognisance of such violations brought to its notice by the petitioners.

Meanwhile, the government counsel told the Bench that the amendment to rectify the error in the Karnataka Epidemic Disease Act, 2020 would be carried out during the forthcoming winter session of the State Legislature.

Start-up uses tech to help Covid patients in Leh

Its software allows city specialists to provide critical care expertise

Cloudphysician, a Bengaluru-based start-up, has joined the efforts to combat the coronavirus outbreak in the remote Ladakh region by deploying the power of technology.

Seated at the company's command centre and using software in the city, a group of ICU experts, including doctors and nurses has been offering TeleICU consultations to their counterparts at SNM Government Hospital, a tertiary clinic located at 12,000 feet altitude in Leh, Ladakh, since November 13.

In fact, Cloudphysician Healthcare has been picked by the Department of Science and technology (DST) to bridge the dearth of expertise at remote areas using technology. Under an initiative called Centre for Augmenting War Against Covid-19 Health Crisis (CAWACH), the National Science and Technology Entrepreneurship Development Board (NSTEDB) that functions under the DST picked up 40

out of 800 companies that applied for the initiative to harness technology in the fight against Covid.

Cloudphysician is one of the companies that received grants and interest-free loans to come up with solution. In fact, the company has received Rs 75 lakh for the effort.

Dr Dhruv Joshi, co-founder, Cloudphysician Healthcare, who is also a pulmonary and critical care specialist, told DH that the Leh hospital had a dearth of ICU specialists. "But the patients were plenty," he pointed out.

"The ten-bedded ICU is full. Despite the low population, the infectivity is high. There are only one or two tertiary hospitals in the area, one of them being SNM Government Hospital," he added. Changing ventilator settings and recommending an appropriate treatment protocol for patients in Leh are some of the things the command centre here helps with.

Dr Dileep Raman, an Internal Medicine, Critical Care and Pulmonary Medicine specialist and also a co-founder of Cloudphysician, said the command centre in Bengaluru had three to five ICU doctors and nurses at any shift. "Some of the medications are pretty strong and only experienced nurses can handle," he said, "Covid ICU complications range from cardiac, renal and lung infections."

Dr Raman pointed out that the specialists at the command centre are only rendering ICU expertise and would not try replacing the bedside doctors. The team uses a software called RADAR that has components for video feed, writing notes, chat and a module to record and review the patient's vital signs both by the bedside doctor and the experts at the command centre.

"There are multiple video streams that we receive, one is a high-definition one, where we can even look at the patient's eyes and breathing patterns. We can even take images of the monitor where we do real time analytics. Another video stream is a standard teleconference one, for patient counselling, and talking to family members," said Dr Raman.

App-based vaccination to cover all strays

Pilot project in two wards yields encouraging results

oving away from the complaint-based rabies vaccination programme, the BBMP has adopted the scientific method of vaccinating the strays.

Using the mobile app provided by the NGO World Wide Veterinary Services, the civic body could map the vaccinated strays. It conducted a pilot project in Herohalli and Nagarabhavi in October and managed to vaccinate 85% of the strays in a month.

Dr C Lakshminarayana, Joint Director, Animal Husbandry, BBMP, said that they vaccinated 1,537 dogs in Herohalli and 413 in Nagarabhavi, besides 121 strays in Binnypet.

"The process is not timebound as the area of the ward, the number of dogs mapped and difficulty in catching dogs, especially in open areas, need to be kept in mind," he explained.

He pointed out that the stray dog census conducted through the WWVS app in 2019 November to enable the mapping process helped the officials in estimating the number of dogs in both wards. "A vaccinated dog will be marked with a coloured dye to avoid vaccinating the same dog twice. The dye is waterproof and lasts for four to six months. Unless all the dogs are vaccinated, we will not move to the next ward," Dr Lakshminarayana said.

Dr S Shashikumar, the previous joint director, said a systematic approach had helped them vaccinate more dogs in the two wards.

Contractors working on ABC and ARV programmes in each zone will be drafted in for the new project. Vehicles used for the project will have at least five to six dog catchers who will help officials vaccinate the strays. The veterinary inspector or other officials will take pictures of the dogs and upload them into the app with GPS coordinates on the spot.

Won't divert OBC funds for Veerashaiva-Lingayat Corp: Govt

Backward Classes Welfare dept to bear initial costs

the funds earmarked for the development of other backward classes (OBC) will not be diverted for the newly-established Veerashaiva-Lingayat Development Corporation, the government said on Tuesday.

Chief Minister B S Yediyurappa, in a big dole, has set aside Rs 500 crore for the new Veerashaiva-Lingayat corporation. The initial cost of setting up the corporation will be borne by the Backward Classes Welfare department, stoking fears that funds kept for other communities might be diverted.

The allocation of Rs 500 crore for the Veerashaiva-Lingayat corporation is a separate one," Additional Chief Secretary (backward classes welfare) Gangaram Baderiya told DH, allaying fears that it would eat into the funds kept for other OBCs.

"The initial cost of setting up the corporation won't be much as it involves procedures such as registration," he added.

According to Baderiya, the administrative cost of running the corporation will not exceed Rs 4 crore annually.

Lingayat body gets first chief

Chief Minister BS Yediyurappa on Tuesday ap-pointed Karnataka Veerashaiya Vidyabhiyruddhi Samsthe president BS Paramashiyaiah as the first chairperson of the new Veerashaiva-Lingayat Development Corporation. Yediyurappa is said to have pushed for Paramashiyajah, 81 to be nominated to the Legislative Council, Paramashiyaiah is also vice-president of the Karnataka State Co-Operative Urban Bank Federation Ltd.

haiva-Lingayat corporation states that the cost incurred by the backward classes welfare department will be reimbursed later by the company.

"Over a period of time, a corporation will create its own assets and infrastructure. Its money will be kept in the banks and interest will be accrued. That's how the reimbursement will happen," Baderiya explained.

The Veerashaiva-Lingayat community is estimated to form about 16% of the state's population and is considered to be the BJP's core support base. Yediyurappa, a Lingayat, is said to be keen to consolidate the community's support amid talks of a change in leadership.

Allocation of Rs 500 crore for the Veerashaiva-Lingayat community surpasses the amount of money set aside for others in the current fiscal - Christians (Rs 200 crore), nomadic/semi-nomadic groups (Rs 78 crore),

Ambigara Chowdaiah (Rs 50 crore), Vishwakarma (Rs 25 crore), leather artisans (Rs 12.5 crore), Upparas (Rs 10 crore), Arya Vysya (Rs 10 crore) and Kumbara (Rs 10 crore).

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the allocation for all community-specific boards and corporations got slashed by half, "Our allocation was reduced to Rs 5 crore from the original Rs 10 crore," Karnataka State Arya Vysya Community Development Corporation chairperson D S Arun

In spite of the fund crunch, the Arya Vysya corporation has planned to start a job portal and personality development programmes. 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Breach of Covid rules: HC asks political parties to file response

Govt told to furnish particulars on fine recovered

the high court on Tuesday made major political parties as respondents in the PILs seeking direction for strict implementation of Covid-19 rules - wearing masks and maintaining social distancing.

The court has asked the political parties to file responses as to whether they will issue strict instructions to party workers to follow the rules.

A division bench headed by Chief Justice Abhay S Oka said

that the Covid rules on wearing masks and social distancing were being observed more in breach in in large political ral-

The court observed that the state government had not taken any action in such instances and in some cases the authorities took some action belatedly.

"Prima Facie it is the responsibility of political parties to ensure strict implementation of rules regarding wearing masks and maintaining social distancing. Time has come when political parties issue strict instrucrules," the bench said.

Meanwhile, the petitioners pointed out that a political party Kannada Chalavali Vatal Paksha-has called for a state bandh on December 5 and there was a likelihood of breach of rules.

The court directed the pe titioners to implead BJP, CPI (M), Indian National Congress, JD (S) and Kannada Chalavali Vatal Paksha as respondents. The court called upon the added respondents to submit whether they were willing to issue instructions to their partyworkers

tions to its workers about these to strictly abide by the rules of wearing masks and social distancing. The court also directed Kannada Chalavali Vatal Paksha to submit a similar response in view of the bandh called for.

> The court also observed that the statement of objection filed by the state government was silent about the recovery of the fine amount. In view of the admitted fact that there are large scale violations, the court directed the state government to file supplementary statements of objections detailing the fine amount recovered.

Govt yet to zero in on vaccine to be administered in state

A mid a clamour for vaccines after four international prototypes were shown to have efficacy against Covid-19, the state government says a decision has not yet been taken about which vaccine will be deployed in Karnataka.

"There are many companies which are at different stages of vaccine development. Based on scientific advice, the central government will decide which vaccine should be procured and administered," said the Minister of Health, Dr K Sudhakar.

The choice of vaccine will dictate the state's level of preparedness and how many deep freezers or refrigerators the government would need for vaccine storage.

A state government audit has found that the government currently has only 10 walk-incoolers and four walk-in-freezers. Dr Sudhakar said that the Department of Health and Family Welfare will supply a further three walk-in-coolers and two walk-in-freezers.

The Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna vaccines use a nucleoside-modified messenger RNA to goad the body's own cells into generating antiviral effects against the Sars-CoV-2 virus. However, both require deep freeze coolers with temperatures as low as -70°C for storage. In contrast, the Oxford Astra-Zeneca vaccine uses a genetically modified virus as does the Russian Gamelya Sputnik V vaccine. Both require only standard

refrigeration temperatures of -4 to -8°C for storage.

Prof Bhojraj Suresh, director of JSS Hospital in Mysuru, a WHO-approved vaccine site which has been conducting human trials of the Astra-Zeneca and Sputnik V vaccines, said that while much has been made of the efficacy of the vaccines, affordability and deployability are equally pressing matters for India.

"Itisn'tenough to simply say that a vaccine candidate has 95% efficacy against the virus. A vaccine's potential is also dictated by how quickly it can be distributed and deployed, using what storage facilities. Plus the life of the vaccine and cost have to be taken into account," Suresh said.

While the Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna vaccines have displayed the highest efficacy against the virus, Suresh pointed out that neither of these two vaccines has undergone trials in India.

"It is contingent on how the immune structure of the body will respond to the design of the vaccine. The Pfizer vaccine may well be deployed in India, but it has not undergone trials in India. There could be an added delay in deploying it here, because it would need to be certified first," he said.

This delay could potentially prompt the state government to attempt to deploy Sputnik V and the Oxford vaccines. "The issue is still premature to discuss," Sudhakar said.

However, he added that 2,855 cold chain points have been set up for storage and distribution of vaccines. Plans are underway to set up three new regional vaccine stores at: Bengaluru Urban, Shivamogga and Ballari, where the government seeks to instal walk-in-coolers and walk-in-freezers.

In a statement, Amit Chopra, managing director, Thermo Fisher Scientific, India and Middle East, said that "with many vaccine frontrunners in advanced stages of human studies, there is a need for large-scale cold storage facilities to accommodate one or more versions."

SC notice to Centre for fixing maximum rate for RT-PCR test

NEW DELHI, DHNS: The Supreme Court on Tuesday issued notice to the Union government on a petition filed by lawyer Ajay Agrawal for a direction to the Union government to fix the maximum rate for the RT-PCR test to Rs 400 for all Covid-19 patients uniformly across the country.

At present, the RT-PCR test is being fixed between the range of Rs 900 to Rs 2800 by various state governments, Union Territories and NCT of Delhi.

A bench of Chief Justice S A Bobde and Justices A S Bopanna and V Ramasubramanian sought a response from the Centre and Ministry of Health on a PIL by the Bofors-fame lawyer.

The petition filed by Agrawal sought a direction to the governments to fix the maximum rate for the RT-PCR (real-time reverse transcription-polymerase chain reaction) test.

"There is a big loot by laboratories and they are minting money to the tune of crores and crores of rupees. The margin of profit is so high as it is as high as 1400% in Andhra Pradesh and 1200% in Delhi," the plea filed by Agrawal claimed.

Metro work in full swing at tallest road-cum-rail flyover in South

AMIDST the bustling traffic all around, nearly 1,000 workers are busy at work 24x7 on the RV Road to Bommasandra Line (Reach-5) of Bangalore Metro. The undisputed attraction on this line is the Jayadeva Interchange Metro station that will connect this line with the Nagawara to Gottigere (Reach-6) line.

With five layers at the station that would soar to a height of 31 metres, it is set to be the tallest road-cum-rail flyover in South India, said N Sadashiva, Reach-5 Deputy Chief Engineer, Bang alore Metro Rail Corporation Limited. "The road level, concourse area, R-5 level, Reach-6 level and the roof structure make it a unique piece of construction," he said. Four rig machines were imported from China for its work.

The Reach-5 elevated line runs to 6.3 km and is dotted by

239 piers. "We have completed 65% of the civil work on this line, which comprises five stations of RV Road, Ragigudda, Jayadeva, BTM Layout and Silk Board stations. The foundation for piles, which is the crucial task, has been completed for all," Sadashiva said.

A massive task had begun on Monday, that of pouring 850 cubic metres of concrete mixture onto the concourse area using specially designed machines. The concourse runs to a length of 53 metres, a height of 2.2 metres and a depth of 2.2 metres.

"Transit mixers which shifted the concrete from a plant in Bommanahalli were poured into a Boom Placer machine which used a pump to raise the mixture to the height of the structure and pour down the concrete," he explained.

The contractor for the line is a joint venture formed by two concerns, HCC and URCC, explained another engineer at the spot. They began work in January 2018.

The iconic flyover was completely demolished in July 2020 to facilitate the interchange station.

Work came to a standstill for nearly four months due to the pandemic and labour shortage. But work is on at a fast pace now.

The line is expected to be fully ready by December 2021 but would be commissioned anytime in 2022.

Yelachenahalli Line to begin operations in early Dec


may take two weeks."

THE Karnataka government has identified 29,451 vaccination sites and 10,008 vaccinators in line with India's Universal Immunisation Programme (UIP), Health Minister Dr K Sudhakar said on Tuesday

Sudhakar said on Tuesday.

Talking to the media after a video conference with Chief Minister B S Yediyurappa, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Home Minister Amit Shah, he said Karnataka is well-prepared to deliver the Covid vaccine when it arrives.

The state government has already compiled the data on health workers in government facilities. Nearly 80% of private institutions have also submitted their data, and the remaining institutions will do so in a week's time. Health workers and Covid frontline across the state are slated to be vaccinated first.

He said that there is no dearth of cold storage facilities in the state, and that there are

2,855 cold chain points for storage and distribution of vaccines.

"To have a better supply chain network and distribution of vaccines in a timely manner, three new Regional Vaccine Stores are proposed to be set up in Bengaluru Urban, Shivamogga and Ballari districts. These proposed vaccine stores will require walk-in coolers and walk-in freezers," Dr Sudhakar said.

He said that Karnataka has 10 walk-in coolers and 4 walk-in freezers, and that the Union Ministry of Health would supply 3 walk-in coolers and 2 walk-in freezers, for which the necessary civil works were being initiated. A list of cold storage facilities and equipment under the state's animal husbandry department are also being compiled. Also, spare cold storage facilities available with private hospitals, especially hospital chains are being assessed.

In order to have an exact assessment of the cold storage capacity required for the Covid-19 vaccine programme, the number of doses in each vial, and the volume of a vial etc, need to be assessed.

need to be assessed.
On dry storage facilities, Dr Sudhakar said that the state is yet to assess the availability. He said that the Centre has already allocated a certain number of cold chain equipment according to UIP norms and that Karnataka has informed the Centre about additional requirement.

Students, lecturers test +ve, a week after reopening

A week after colleges reopened, a small number of teachers and students have tested positive in Vijayapura district while the results of many others are awaited.

Colleges in the state resumed classes on November 17, nearly nine months after they were closed due to the pandemic. The University Grants Commission had permitted colleges to hold physical classes provided students get an undertaking from their parents and a negative Covid test report before entering college premises.

However, on the day of reopening, not even 1% of students

turned up for classes, one of the reasons being that they were waiting for their test results.

During the past week, district health authorities have been conducting tests for staff and students at the Karnataka state Akkamahadevi Women's University (KSAWU), and private and government colleges in the district.

"A total of 3,000 samples were collected and tested for Covid-19 from the colleges across the district. Of them, 13 teachers and 12 students have tested positive so far and the results of around 1,000 samples are awaited," the district administration said.

Deputy Commissioner P Sunil Kumar told The New Indian Express, "We have not sealed down any college as the students and lecturers have undergone tests before entering college premises. We are continuing to test students by coordinating with the colleges."

The district health authori-

ties do not know which institution the infected lecturers and students belong to.

Professor Onkar Kakade, acting Vice-chancellor of KSAWU said, "We are yet to get the details of how many lecturers and students have tested positive but we are disinfecting classrooms each day. The students are yet to turn-up in good numbers to colleges."

Meanwhile, many colleges are continuing online classes due to poor turnout. Professor Ashok Pujari, principal of a private college said, "Since the college reopened only five students have come. Many have stayed away as they are yet to get their test reports. So we are continuing the online classes."

Notice to parties over violation of Covid norms

THE Karnataka High Court on Tuesday issued notice to political parties over a large number of mask and social distancing regulation violations during rallies and also possible violations during the proposed bandh called on December 5.

The bench directed the PIL petitioner, Letzkit Foundation, to implead the political parties as respondents.

On the last date of hearing, as the government had informed the court that its intention was not to punish anyone for violating the regulations under the Karnataka Epidemic Diseases Act and hence it proposed to issue fresh ordinance to amend the regulations, the bench had directed the petitioner to furnish the list of recognised political parties to implead them as respondents and issue notice to them.

Accordingly, the petitioner's counsel submitted the list

while expressing apprehension about violation during the proposed bandh to protest the setting up of Maratha Development Authority by the government.

Then the bench said that there are instances of a large number of violations where rallies are organised by the political parties, as pointed out in the records submitted by the petitioner.

Either the state government has taken no action, or to save face has taken action against only a few. It is the responsibility of political parties to issue strict instructions to their workers, the bench observed





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K'taka has 10k vaccinators, 30k sites, claims Bommai

Bengaluru: The state government is set to deliver, distribute and store Covid-19 vaccine when it's available, home minister Basavaraj Bommai said.

After Prime Minister Narendra Modi's video conference with chief ministers, including BS Yediyurappa, on Tuesday to chalk out strategy, Bommai said a state-level steering committee headed by Yediyurappa will be formed to monitor the drive to vaccinate the state's 6.5 crore population.

Health and medical education minister K Sudhakar said the government has identified 29,451 vaccination sites and 10,008 vaccinators as per the Universal Immunisation Programme norms. The state has 10 walk-in coolers and 4 walkin freezers. "The Centre will supply three walk-in coolers and two walk-in freezers for which civil work has been initiated," he said.

The vaccine will be distributed on priority to Corona warriors, citizens over 50 years and those with comorbidities.

"Modi said arrangements for vaccination centres will be like preparations at the booth level for elections. These centres should be formed and workers trained for it," Bommai said.

A digital platform will be developed to collate inoculation data, as people who are vaccinated might require two or three doses to achieve resistance to the virus, he said.

Covid helped BBMP see beyond roads, waste

Bengaluru: Public health, never among BBMP's priorities, is now at the top, thanks to the pandemic. Bengaluru was where the state's first Covid-19 case was reported and the city continues to account for around half of the state's daily infections.

Initially, the focus of the Palike's was to screen, isolate or quarantine international travellers. Another measure was to prepare state-run Rajiv Gandhi Institute of Chest Disease to handle patients – the city's first Covid-only facility.

galuru model', hailed for its tech approach to trace contacts, took a beating. Bengaluru reported the highest number of infections among all cities in the country for several days in row.

The Palike's response was plagued with glitches, beginning with a delay in ambulances reaching patients to hospitals turning patients away. BBMP's move to barricade houses of infected people also led to stigma and fear of the virus.

With the city's response in

chaos, the government ushered in a change of guard, bringing in N Manjunatha Prasad, principal secretary, revenue, as BBMP commissioner on July 18. The first thing Prasad did was to inspect private hospitals. The government then used all possible legal means to ensure hospitals kept 50% of their beds to treat patients referred by public authorities.

Action was taken against non-compliance. More ambulances were added and the central control room for monitoring beds was made more efficient.

"We hired 1,500 people on contract basis as swab collectors, lab technicians and data entry operators and their work has been crucial in testing and reporting." Prasad said. "In July, there were not enough testing facilities. We had to streamline the patient referral system. Not only was bed shortage a concern, we didn't have enough crematoria for fatalities in July. A dozen more graveyards were added, four of which were only for Covid victims."

The city has conducted more than 44 lakh tests and its daily target is 55,000 tests. The Palike is now gearing up to roll out the vaccine.

"We are working on vaccine storage in 141 primary health centres falling under BBMP," Prasad said.

HC demands response from parties on SOPs

Bengaluru: The high court on Tuesday directed impleaded political parties and organisations to state whether they are willing to instruct their workers to strictly abide by rules about wearing masks and social distancing in public places.

A division bench headed by chief justice Abhay Shreeniwas Oka gave this direction after directing the petitioner to implead the major political parties — BJP, Congress, CPI, CPM, and the JD(S).

The bench, hearing a PIL filed by Bengaluru-based NGO Letzkit Foundation seeking strict implementation of SOP norms, pointed out that recently, there have been large political rallies where rules about masks and social distancing are only observed in breach.

"It is found that either the state government has not taken any action or in some instances, action was taken belatedly. Prima facie, it is the responsibility of political parties to ensure strict implementation of rules... Time has come when political parties have to issue strict instructions to their workers," the bench observed.

M'rashtra readies 10-member taskforce

Mumbai: Chief minister Uddhav Thackeray informed PM Modi the state has formed a task force to iron out all issues related to procurement, transportation and distribution of the Covid-19 vaccine. Headed by the chief secretary, the 10-member task force will include senior secretaries from the planning, finance, public health and medical education departments, some members from the state task force on Covid-19 and senior doctors from JJ and KEM hospitals.

"The state has set up a task force as some more clarity is required regarding the vaccine. It will study the requirement, procurement, distribution, cost and even possible side effects of the vaccine," said Thackeray. Thackeray along with CMs of other states attended two meetings chaired by Modi to review the Covid1-9 situation and discuss vaccine distribution. He said the Maharashtra government is in touch with Adar Poonawalla, CEO of Serum Institute of India (SII), which is a partner in the Oxford-Astra Zeneca vaccine.

Public health minister Rajesh Tope said five vaccines are currently under various stages of development in the country, of which two are indigenous and the rest are private efforts. Tope said as per the discussions regarding the vaccination drive, it is understood that the Centre will be steering the effort. TNN

Pune-based Serum Institute as a major manufacturing partner. Oxford University said on Monday that the vaccine candidate prevented 70% people from the infection in a large trial and it was set to initiate talks with regulators across the world to start supplies. There is also a locally developed vaccine candidate by Bharat Blotech and ICMR which too has shown promise during clinical trials and is currently undergoing phase 3 human trials.

The PM said the government was closely watching the development of vaccines and was in touch with Indian and foreign developers and manufacturers, global regulators, foreign governments, multilateral institutions and others.

He said a comprehensive plan for vaccine administration rollout would soon be ready and asked states to set up steering committees and structures down to the block level to ensure inoculation as and when the vaccine came. There is currently no approved vaccine in the world, so we have to concentrate on corona (in the) meanwhile. It should not happen that having come this far, our boat sinks in shallow waters. We have to concentrate on reducing transmission, do vigorous contact tracing, keep positivity rate below 5% and keep case fatality rate below 1%, continue with awareness campaigns," Modi said. He added that it was important to increase RT-PCR tests, ensure better monitoring of patients, better equip health centres at village and community level and keep running awareness campaigns for safety.

Why shouldn't RT-PCR test cost be capped at ₹400: SC

New Delhi: The Supreme Court on Tuesday sought the Centre's response to a PIL which sought capping of RT-PCR test for Covid-19 at Rs 400 for both government and private labs and hospitals, saying the cost of the kits have come down to Rs 200 now.

Petitioner Ajay Agrawal told a bench, headed by CJI S A Bobde, that while in Delhi RT-PCR test costs around Rs 2,400, it varied from Rs 900 (in Haryana) to Rs 3,200 (Meghalaya) in other states. "There is a big loot by the laboratories and they are minting money to the tune of crores. The margin of profit is as high as 1400% in Andhra Pradesh and 1200% in Delhi. The RT-PCR kits are presently available for less than Rs 200 in the Indi-

an market. There is no other cost involved in conducting the test," he said.

The bench sought response from the Centre in two weeks and tagged it along with another PIL filed by Sachin Jain, which was filed in the initial days of the pandemic and still pending. Jain had sought affordable health care and curbing the private hospitals' tendency to exploit the situation by overcharging Covid patients.

On August 31, the bench had said: "In the said meeting, all the states and UTs, may be advised to come up, within 2 weeks of the first meeting, with a master plan, both legislative and executive, taking cue from the already existing Public Health Acts of various states and taking cue from the National Health Bill, 2009."

Dumping your trash slyly on the road? BBMP to install cameras at black spots to watch you and catch you

o give some muscle to the Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) marshals, to stop people from dumping of garbage on the roads, the Palike is planning to install more CCTV cameras in public places. This is a reprise of the Palike's plan in 2017 to set up 2,500 CCTV cameras to monitor illegal garbage dumping. At that time, the BBMP had given 10 lakh for each ward to set up cameras and a monitoring centre at the ward and zonal level.

While officials say that digital surveillance instils fear among those who are throwing garbage illegally, some residents say the areas which do not have cameras could become the new black spots.

Last week, the KR Puram zone of the BBMP floated tenders for installing CCTV cameras in wards such as Basavanapura, Devasandra, KR Puram, Rammurthy Nagar, A Narayanapura, HAL Airport ward and Vignan Nagar. The proposal

K'taka reports 1,870 C+ cases, 17 deaths

In the first phase, the government is expecting at least six crore vaccines, of which 50 per cent will be sent to Britain and Sweden, while the remaining three crore vaccines will be distributed in India. Sources said the Centre will distribute 1.5 crore to all States and Union Territories and will be administered among healthcare workers and other frontline covid warriors free of cost. The remaining 1.5 crore vaccines will be released in the open market through the manufacturer.

On a priority basis, the Centre has decided to administer 30 crore people that includes healthcare oficials, frontline warriors including pourakarmikas, police, armed forces and other volunteers. People in the age group of 50 and above will also be given priority.

There will be 29,451 vaccination centres in Karnataka. The State health department has already identified 10,008 vaccinator staff. Private hospitals, which have been asked to

provide details of their health care staff, have already shared close to 80 per cent of the details and the remaining is expected to be released soon, Health Minister K Sudhakar said. According to him, the government has already made adequate preparations for vaccination storage and distribution.

During an interaction, Prime Minister Narendra Modi asked the Chief Ministers to set up a state-level steering committee headed by them, besides district and taluk-level committees.

Bommai said Modi asked states to

draw healthcare workers from both the government and the private hospitals and enlist volunteers to ensure proper distribution and administration of vaccines. He added that Modi has asked states to continue the ongoing treatment for covid-19 and follow precautionary measures to contain the pandemic. "He (Modi) asked us to fully prepare for vaccination and keep fighting the virus," Bommai said, quoting the Prime Minister.

When asked if there was any date fixed for beginning vaccination, Bommai said it is difficult to fix any date.



group to identify the offenders," he said.

Besides the zonal offices, the BBMP's Solid Waste Management division too has a similar plan. It has already prepared a detailed action plan to install CCTV cameras across 198 wards. "Some areas have had it for some time. They are working well. We have prepared a plan to install more cameras in about 100 places where large black spots exist," said a senior BBMP official. The initiative, officials say, will be of help in identifying those who are dumping waste, be it the local residents or the commercial establishments. "Since we already have marshals on the ground, we can either penalise or educate them so that they do not repeat it. We also get to understand the root cause of such offences, which could be due to the irregular waste collection or some other reason," the official explained.

They also bet on the patterns in human behaviour to act responsibly if they know that they are being monitored.

Some residents say this is a waste of money. Sneha Nandihal of I Change Indiranagar said the officials should focus on addressing the root cause of the problem. "In some places, collection of waste may not be happening properly. Officials should be looking at different solutions instead of the cameras. Even if the BBMP installs them, there is all possibility that dumping might happen in places that are not monitored," she said. VK Srivatsa, a resident of Balaji Layout in Hemmigepura wondered if the CCTV cameras will be monitored round the clock. "We know that a lot of CCTV cameras are either dead or not monitored well. The BBMP might do this just because they have the budget. But if they are not monitored well, it won't work. People are also very smart. They will definitely find many places to throw garbage," he said. Sandhya Narayan, a solid waste management expert, said the CCTV cameras are needed to fix black spots. She suggested that the BBMP must take help of active local residents including apartments to monitor these cameras. "The cameras will identify whether it is the commercial establishments or the residents who are dumping the waste," she said.

State Identifies 30k Sites, 10k Vaccinators

At PM's meet, CM says Karnataka fully equipped for a smooth rollout of vaccine as and when it is ready

Bengaluru: With a near clarity emerging on the release of Covid-19 vaccines in the next few weeks, Karnataka is gearing up for a vaccination effort unprecedented in scale as well as the size of population targeted at one go. The state has about seven crore people.

Karnataka is fully equipped for a smooth rollout of the vaccine as and when it is ready, chlef minister BS Yediyurappa informed a meeting of chief ministers of eight states addressed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Tuesday via video conferencine.

di on Tuesday via video conferencing.
The government, health & medical education minister K Sudhakar said, has identified
29,451 vaccination sites and 10,008 vaccinators. He also said the state will make use of
the 2,855 cold chain centres for storing antiCovid jats. Besides, the government will tap
the infrastructure at the animal husbandry
and veterinary science department, and put
its cold storage facility also to use, he added.

The state is going by the guidelines of the Centre in the delivery, distribution and administration of vaccines, the health minister said. Healthcare workers, Covid warriors, people with comorbid conditions and senior citizens will get the vaccine shots on priority in view of a higher risk they face.

The health department has kept the data

on healthcare workers battling the infection at government facilities ready. As for health facilities in the private sector, 80% of them have shared the data and the government is hopeful of gathering the rest in about a week's time.

The minister said the state has identified

three new regional vaccine stores in Bengaluru Urban, Shivamogga and Baliari. These stores will require additional walk-in coolers and walk-in freezers which will be supplied shortly, he said. "Assessment of the vaccine stores has been completed. The state has 10 walk-in coolers and four

walk-in freezers and the Centre will supply additional facilities," Sudhakar said.

A steering committee headed by the chief minister will take all important decisions on vaccine supply and administration, home minister Basavaraj Bommai said. Expert committees will monitor the vaccination efforts at the district and the taluk levels, he added.

Karnataka has been witnessing a steady decline in positivity as well as death rates, raising hopes of a faster recovery of the economy. Health minister Sudhakar tweeted that the state's polymerase chain reaction (RT-PCR) tests per lakh population is the highest in the country. "As on Monday, Karnataka conducted 1,03,29,743 tests out of which 71,03,652 (68.77%) are RT-PCR tests, clocking more than 16,000 tests per lakh population." The state's positivity ratenow stands at 1.57% and the fatality rate is 1.59%. As on Monday, the number of active cases in the state was 24,708 of which 18,409 were from Bengaluru.

The mood over the past few days has turned celebratory due to the torrent of media reports about a few global pharma players pushing the boundaries for an early launch. AstraZeneca-Oxford, Moderna and Pfizer-BioNTech SE have reported varying degrees of efficacy, raising hopes. Within India too, Bharat Biotech is developing an Indigenous vaccine with ICMR.

Centre Flags High Covid Nos in 4 Opposition-ruled States

Delhi, Maharashtra, Kerala and Rajasthan in the spotlight

New Delhi: Four opposition-ruled states, Delhi, Maharashtra, Kerala and Rajasthan, have been flagged as the biggest concerns by the Centre on the Covid-19 front after a review by Prime Minister Narendra Modi with the chief ministers on Tuesday, given a high test positivity rate and deaths there over the last one week.

In a presentation made at the meeting, the health ministry pointed out that Delhi had seen an average of 111 deaths daily in the past one week while Rajasthan, which had so far done well in keeping the number of deaths per million low, was now repor-



ting an extremely high average of 21% test positivity rate since last week.

The average test positivity rate was also high at 15.3% in Kerala and 13.5% in Delhi while Maharashtra still has a high average of daily deaths at 93 over the past one week though the state has managed to reduce its test positivity average to 8.2%. The health ministry in its presen-

tation pointed out that the national average test positivity rate over the past one week was at 4.7% and the four states in question need to work much harder to bring down their test positivity rate below 5%, as directed by the PM at the meeting. PM also said the fatality rate should be brought below 1% but this seems difficult soon.

As per the presentation,

Delhi and Maharashtra are big concerns here reporting 448 and 379 deaths per million respectively, which is nearly four times the national average.

Delhi chief minister Arvind Kejriwal, however, assured the PM that Delhi will turn the corner soon and said the positivity rate and the number of cases in the national capital were now on the decline after seeing a high of 8,600 cases last week. He also blamed the rising air pollution in Delhi due to stubble fires to be a major cause for the rising Covid cases and asked for PMs intervention to stop this. Kejriwal also asked the PM for 1,000 beds to be reserved in central government hospitals in Delhi for Covid patients given the rising number of cases.

GEARING UP FOR COVID IMMUNISATION DRIVE

3 crore Frontline Workers to Receive Vaccine First

Second group to be given priority will be elderly, with a focus on those with co-morbidities

New Delhi: The government has estimated that there are around 3 cro-re healthcare workers and frontline workers in high-risk sectors who will receive the first shot of the Covid vaccine, as and when it becomes

available in the country.
This means up to 60-million doses, depending on the dosage regimen of different vaccines, will be reserved for the first group of people who will be vaccinated. Frontline workers will include po-

others will include po-lice personnel, sanitation staff and others. The second group of people to get priority are the elderly, with special focus on those with co-mor-bidities. These are estimated to be another 25-27 crore individuals who could account for another 500-540 million doses.

These numbers are being computed

by the health authorities as they gear up for a massive immunisation pro-gramme to begin as soon as a corona-virus vaccine is available. The Centre will procure the Covid-19 vaccines directly from drug makers and dis-tribute them to the states. Serum Institute of India, the stra-

tegic manufacturing partner of AstaZeneca in India, has said it can manufacture 400 million doses of the vaccine by April 2021, subject to the company getting regulatory approvals. In addition, vaccines develo-ped by Bharat Blotech and Zydus Ca-dilla are undergoing phase-III and phase-II clinical trials respectively.



Indian vaccine makers also have manufacturing tie-ups with Novavax and Johnson&Johnson, whose vaccine candidates too are undergoing trials.

A senior government official said

state governments have a list of healthcare workers and other frontline workers. "District immunisation of-ficers and other relevant officials will provide the list," he said.

The second group of the elderly, in-cluding those with co-morbidities, will be required to enrol voluntarily for the vaccination programme, and will be subject to verification, said the official. People in high-priority groups, selected to receive the Co-vid-19 vaccine first and for free, will get SMS alerts with details of their vaccination session including time, date and location and the vaccinator's name.
